General Township News - Connie Skinner

We're excited to announce that we've been awarded partial funding through the Ohio EPA's H2Ohio Rivers Chloride Reduction Grant Program. We will receive \$6,979, which will go toward installing a brine spraying system on our F-450 truck. This will help us clear intersections and hazardous roadways more efficiently during the winter months, as part of Governor DeWine's initiative to reduce road salt usage.

After two zoning board meetings and two trustees meetings, Henmick's rezoning request for their North Old State Road property was approved with modifications. It is currently facing a referendum. The Board of Elections is still determining if we'll hold a spring election. If not, the referendum will appear on the Fall 2025 ballot. This November's Election Day is on the 5th and our polling location is the township hall.

For those who attended the Career Center or Vocational School on State Route 521, we encourage you to visit the Byxbe Campus. It is now home to various county offices including the County Engineers, Regional Planning, Soil and Water, and more. Located at 1610 State Route 521, this campus also offers meeting rooms for rent. Next door, at 1776 State Route 521, you'll find the new Sheriff's Department. Plans are also in place for a Developmental Disabilities and Social Services building in this area. Across from the Byxbe Campus, land annexed by the city is set to be developed into a mix of single and multi-family homes. With annexation, the township's zoning and our voices are lost.

Lastly, we're working with the Delaware County Foundation to establish a fund that will allow donations to Brown Township. These funds can be used for community improvements, such as walking paths, park upgrades, and necessary equipment. We'll share more details once we have them on Facebook and in our spring newsletter. Many other townships, including Orange, Delaware, and Genoa, have similar funds. For example, Orange Township successfully used their fund to help finance their Veterans Memorial, which opened in September.

"Delaware County Emergency Communications is excited to announce a new tool to keep citizens informed and collect feedback on non-lifethreatening calls for service. DelComm is now sending text message surveys after certain types of interactions with 911 and our department using PowerEngage. Each survey will ask just a few questions about your satisfaction and allow you to provide feedback. Surveys are sent out approximately six hours after the call. Your feedback is important to us; we want to know how we are doing. Not everyone will receive a survey, and residents who do not want to participate

can simply not respond. It is important that everyone knows that these surveys should not be used to report any emergency or crime. As always, call 9-1-1 for any emergency or

to report criminal activity."

Winter is approaching

Snow and ice control is one of the most significant winter activities performed. Brown Township is responsible for keeping just over 20 centerline miles of township roads safe and passable whenever winter weather strikes. Our personnel work hard day and night to attempt to keep the roads clear even in the worst weather conditions often sacrificing time away from their families on weekends and holidays.

Salt

As salt is spread over the roadway, it forms brine (moisture and salt) as the snow and ice melt. The snow and ice that remain float on the brine, breaking the bond with the roadway. As more traffic passes over the surface, slush is formed which can be plowed to the sides of the road. Plowing alone cannot accomplish this. Plowing and salting together make safer roadways. Temperatures, time of application, traffic, weather conditions and the type of road surface, are among the many variables that can affect the success of deicing. For instance, at 30° F salt is five times more effective than at 20° F. Salt is used as the principal deicer because it is the most readily available and least expensive deicer. Salt becomes less effective below 20° F. It needs calcium, brine, or beet juice mix added in to become more effective in melting the ice and snow. Average application of salt is 600-800 lbs. per centerline mile.

Brown Township purchases its salt from the Delaware County Engineer's Office at the Salt Barn located on US42 next to the County Jail and our truck will carry 8 tons at \$69.50 per ton (2023-2024 season price) or \$556 per truckload.

Brine

Brine is also used as pre-treatment prior to the snow event/storm and is one of the most useful benefits to being proactive and perform anti-icing before precipitation occurs. This helps prevent snow from bonding to the pavement. A 23.3% solution of brine will lower the freezing point of water from 32° F down to 18° F and breaks up the bond formed between the road and the snow.

Roads

The roads in the township are maintained by Brown Township, Delaware County Engineer, and ODOT. If there is an issue with the roads, please call the entity responsible for that particular road to get a quicker response.

I would like to introduce myself as the new Fire Chief of Tri-Township Fire District. I am grateful for this opportunity to serve the district. I have been a resident of Brown Township since 2004, where my wife and I are raising our son who attends Buckeye Valley Local Schools. Over the Over the course of 23 years, I have had the privilege to work for a few different fire departments in Delaware County. With these departments, I have been able to experience and educate myself in many different important roles within the fire service. I am excited to serve our fire district and help with the safety of our people in this great community!

We have had many new things happening within the fire department. We have recently been able to hire six new part-time position firefighters. These new employees will help the department with our goal to be able to work towards more adequate staffing. Adequate staffing is a huge role in the safety of our community with the amount of growth that we have had in the area over the past few years and also with it still continuing to increase at a high volume.

We also recently took delivery of our new tanker truck. This truck is a 2024 Rosenbauer with a 1,000 GPM pump that holds 2,000 gallons of water. The new truck will replace Tanker 331 ("Sonny Boy") that was purchased for our department in 1992. With this truck being able to hold more water, it is a huge benefit to our community and its more rural areas and also allows us to have a tanker truck at both of our fire stations.


October is fire prevention month! With the cooler weather starting, be sure to hire a qualified professional to clean and inspect your chimney and vents at least once a year. This will help prevent chimney fires. Also, double check your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors- replace batteries twice a year and if the detector is 10 years or older, it is considered expired and will need to be replaced.

Our annual toy and clothing drive for P.I.N. (People In Need) will be on Saturday, December 21 from 9am-3pm at Station 331 (Bowtown Rd.)

TOWNSHIP ROADS - Charlie Miley - Trustee

On our road inspection in September the trustees and county advisor, Doug Riedel, found that our roads were in very good condition. We are now in a phase where we can move past chip and seal to more serious road improvements. In the past few years we have resurfaced Howard and Skinner Roads. We reapplied for OPWC funds to resurface Pittman Road. When funds become available we are considering applying for more OPWC grants. OPWC is a fund in the state budget to award improvement grants to townships, counties and municipalities. This funding is voted on every few years by all voters but do not increase your taxes. Also with our roads being in good shape we have been in position to take on other projects. Two examples are shown here. Above is a rock chute that was installed along the high banks portion on Hogback Rd. to control water erosion from the road. This was contracted out at a cost of \$36,000. The other project below is a road drainage improvement completed by our employees along Kelly McMaster Road. The Road Levy that the voters have supported in the past help assure that these projects can continue .

The 2024 Fans for Friends fan drive has concluded with great FANfare! 










For those of you that have been wondering what is being built on the north edge of Kilbourne. This is the townships new maintenance facility. A unique method was employed for this project. The roof was constructed on the ground where access was easier without scaffolding or ladders. Once that was completed the walls were constructed and attached at the top. The last step was to raise the roof with four large hydraulic scissor jacks and fasten the sides to the bottoms. There were two steel I-beams that ran the length of the building with the hydraulic jacks on the ends. Raising the building took about five minutes. The maintenance office and facilities are located to the right in these pictures and have a different roof line
